This year you'll see some new things: a new George L. Carter Museum and new track under construction at the Doe River Gorge. Tweetsie is also doing heavy track work and is bringing on-line some new equipment also.

Here's the schedule as of the first of March: Friday, May 24, registration and our business meeting with elections for president and secretary. Saturday, May 25, a full day starting at the Doe River Gorge and ending at Tweetsie Railroad. We can visit the DRG as early as 9 am to get enough time to ride in the gorge, see the new construction that Mark Milbourne talks about inside this issue, and have lunch. We're welcome at Tweetsie after 2pm plus we're planning a shop tour. Then after Tweetsie we'll end up at the Dan'l Boone Inn for our annual family-style dinner. Sunday, May 26 is our chance to really get to see what's going on at the newly moved and improved Carter Railroad Museum in downtown Johnson City. There also may be some operating possibilities depending on how the lavout comes together.

Our planned guest speaker at the Business meeting on Friday night is Johnny Graybeal who will give us a preview of his upcoming book on the Shenandoah Central. While a lot of us have a pass-

ing knowledge of the initial preservation of #12, combine 15 and car 11, there's so much more to the story. We don't realize just how close we came to losing these last pieces of ET&WNC narrow gauge equipment had not three businessmen from Virginia's Shenandoah Valley stepped in and by the skin of their teeth rescued a part of history. Come on to the convention and learn some more.

News From Around the ET&WNC Preservation Community

George L. Carter Railroad Museum Inc. dba The Johnson City Railroad Experience

Dr. Fred J. Alsop III. Museum Director and President of the Board sends us this -

A lot of work continues inside the walls of the Taylor Building in Johnson City, TN where the newly-relocated George L. Carter Railroad Museum is slowly taking shape. Many of our volunteers are working hard to reassemble and, in most cases, redesign our major model railroad layouts. The Mountain Empire Model Railroaders have had to accomplish the

most significant redesign to reestablish their Appalachian-themed HO-scale layout into the slightly smaller space their layout will occupy in the new museum. Their MEMRR working group has created a completely new design that will give them 60% more mainline track than they had in our previous location on the ETSU campus, even in the slightly more restricted area now afforded to them, and are working hard to bring their new conceptualized layout to life.

The N-scale layout, representing Knoxville, Tennessee has found a new gallery space and is the layout most likely to be in the most complete stage of readiness when

we open to the public, probably sometime in May 2024. We will certainly be able to host the ET&WNC Railroad Historical Society during your Annual Convention in Johnson City over Memorial Day weekend, and we look forward to showing you our new museum.

The ET&WNC "Tweetsie" layout, will grow some with an additional 100+ feet of sceniced landscape that will allow the addition of the important western towns on the line with the addition of Elizabethton and Johnson City, Tennessee. We think when these additional sections are added to the layout it will favorably vie for being the largest HOn₃/HO scale layout in the world depicting our favorite Appalachian narrow gauge railroad.

We are excited to announce our first staff member hire. Carson Sailor, as our Exhibits Director and Coordinator. Carson will begin his duties on February 19. He has more than 5 years' experience at the Museum of Appalachia and with the "Horn in the West" outdoor drama. Among his many "pluses", he is a railroad enthusiast. Our new pathway to becoming a regional museum with many services, both in-house and through public outreach programs, means we will have to be more than just a building housing several model railroad layouts. This will be a major role that Carson will play as he helps us create exhibits that tell the important story of the railroads and their impact on many Appalachian communities including Johnson City's rich railroad history. We also want people to not only like what they experience on their initial visit to the museum, but to want to come back and encourage their friends to visit us as well. We plan to have dynamic exhibits, some that will be interactive with touch screens, and to rotate our displays as often as possible to keep

the museum experience fresh and exciting.

Our long-awaited non-profit corporation 501(c)(3) federal application was finally approved by the IRS in mid-January and we can now begin to pursue grant opportunities and work to gain corporate sponsors and major donors. The lack of this federal designation has been a setback to potential sources of funding as we waited for more than 4 months for our application to grind its way through the federal system. We look forward to continuing to strengthen our bonds with the city, the university, and the region as we develop the museum.

We are working with the Digital Media Department at

ETSU to create an orientation film as an introduction to the museum and to the area's railroad history. This will be a short 10–12-minute presentation that will be shown in a small theatre setting developed just for this purpose and available to our museum visitors soon after they enter the museum. Combining this video with the many other exhibits currently on site, or planned for the near future, will provide our visitors of all ages with a good grasp of the impact of this form of transportation on the region from the 1850s to the present day.

We will have to monetize the museum with an entrance fee to pay the rent and the

salaries of our employees, as well as the other expenses that come with this kind of major enterprise. We will be establishing a schedule of entrance fees covering a range of visitors from individuals to school groups. All of this adds to the complexity of our new operations, as will the greatly extended hours of operation and being open 5 days/week (as opposed to the 5 hours/1 day a week as we were for 16 years on the university campus). These are the pluses and minuses of becoming a regional museum. We are looking forward to the challenge.

For many years we have used our campus address as the permanent address for our model railroad clubs, our NRHS chapter, the museum, and the ET&WNC RR Historical Society. The Historical Society's Board of Directors has recently accepted the museum's offer to continue to be the permanent address for all correspondence directed to the Society's Treasurer. This continued arrangement will provide stability for mailings to this office from its members, including the payment of annual dues. The museum will continue to collect your mail at this central address and forward it on to the Society Treasurer as it has been doing. As you now have the new address for the George L. Carter Railroad Museum, Inc. let me also give you our new website where you can keep up with all the latest happenings at the museum and follow our progress at johnson-city-railroad-experience.org.

We look forward to the grand opening of The Johnson City **Railroad Experience** in a few months and to your visit during the Society's Convention in Johnson City in late May.

I want to personally apologize for indicating that the issue would be out sooner. We actually thought it would be out by now, but it is still on the way. No more predictions, but we promise that we will get this amazing issue out as soon as possible. It will be worth the wait.

Doe River Gorge

Mark Milbourne reports from Hampton, TN -

Happy (almost) spring! Milder weather has been creeping in already and summer / camp season (and the Convention) will be here before we know it. We had a lot to report last issue as we closed out 2023 and much of it is still in progress. January had a lot of wet weather which prevented remaining grading work from moving very far, which has delayed the track contractor a bit as well, but work is moving forward again much more lately. Be sure to continue monitoring Ryan Rice's YouTube channel, AboveGroundMedia, as he did another drone pass in early February and possibly will have another by the time you read this.

Ballast making is one thing that has continued through the wetter weather, sometimes lately with two large off-road dump tracks shuttling from across the river, rather than the one smaller standard truck. The piles are continuing to grow!

We had most of the track material needed from Oklahoma, but required a few more switches and alternate smaller frogs which we discovered are very hard to find in 90 pound rail and this has also been some delay to the track crew. But finally located and arriving very soon.

Foundations for the railroad shop are completed and the framing is now up (beginnings of this visible in Ryan's last drone pass) and being skinned as I write. Once the shell is up, track and pit framing will be installed and floor/pit concrete poured.

Grading is also just underway for the loading platform area and adjacent multipurpose structure. The first stages of this have a very tight time frame to get concrete and primary steelwork complete as a big crew from Carpenters for Christ has offered and scheduled to come in early June to do all the framing and drywall work. The resulting elevations for this area are requiring some minor changes to track elevation/ grades, but should still work OK operationally.

The new boiler for the first Porter steam locomotive recently arrived. It will need another few weeks to complete on-site details for it and the chassis and then can be set on.

The power lines cutting across the front of main camp need to be moved underground. Conduit for this was anticipated and buried a number of years ago, and now is the time, so preliminary work has been done to locate and excavate the end points and scheduling the pull and changeover.

I have finished going through preliminary prep on the computers that will drive the program soundtrack in the coaches. We've also been finalizing the start and end points of the trackside displays and from that I've done a lot of work lately using the resulting audio track timing to set and map out the position of each along the track.

So, things continue to move along! We continue to have the goal of opening this year, but are also seeing that weather, supply and labor chains and other factors beyond our control leave a lot of uncertainty. But much, VERY MUCH, has happened since Convention time last year, so there will be much to see this year! The gorge end of the RR has been quiet over the winter, but spring track inspection and repairs will be starting soon. We have probably two "Railroad Interns" for the summer and are still looking for a third. Tweetsie Railroad Happenings



Chris Robbins sends this from Blowing Rock, NC -

After a very busy Tweetsie Christmas event ended on December 30th, Tweetsie Railroad closed to the public but continued many improvement and maintenance projects. An exciting new ride is scheduled to arrive this spring that will replace one of our older offerings. More news on this will be announced soon.

Numerous train and track projects are also keeping the Staff busy. In November, we completed the final phase of the trestle renovation. As I write this, we are about to start the final round of crosstie repairs begun in 2021, with several hundred ties ready to be replaced all around the train loop. The entire stretch of track on Main Street has been dug up in preparation for tie replacement, re-bedding, crossing upgrades, and infrastructure improvements for drainage and electrical service along this section of the route.

Our train car refurbishment project is proceeding on schedule. An all-new excursion car was delivered to us around the first of the year, and should be in service at the time of opening day. One by one, all our older cars have been – or will be – rotated through a complete renovation process.

Extensive drive wheel work on Locomotive 190 is now underway in our shop, along with all the routine off-season locomotive maintenance and inspections. Along with the train-related work, our Shop staff is also upgrading several of the park's rides, and numerous improvements are being made to all the park buildings and facilities. The April 6th Opening Day will soon be here, and we're looking forward to another great Season in 2024.
