It was fascinating seeing and holding the iron ore, especially Cranberry Gneiss Granite. These rocks and those in the mines began forming more than 950 million years ago!

At the mine, Catherine Caldwell of NC Resources sadly informed us that the mines contain the largest number of hibernating bats in North Carolina, but they have been contaminated with White Nose Syndrome, a fungus from Europe. There has been a 99 percent decline in this flying insect exterminator.
