News From Around the ET&WNC Preservation Community

George L. Carter Railroad Museum (on the move) with focus on the HOn3 ET&WNC RR layout

Fred J. Alsop III, Director of the museum, sends us this -

The G. L. Carter Railroad Museum on the campus of East Tennessee State University, Johnson City, TN participated in three major events at the end of May and into June. Our members were proud to co-host the East Tennessee & Western North Carolina Railroad Historical Society as part of their Annual Convention here in Johnson City over Memorial Day weekend. The railroad museum hosted Society members for train operations on our nationally-known HOn3 "Tweetsie" layout on Friday and Saturday of the Convention. We had a great time scheduling passenger and freight trains between the layout's termini at Cranberry Iron & Coal Co, Cranberry, NC and Johnson City, TN. The runs made their way through mountain scenery of the Doe River Gorge and through the towns of Roan Mountain, Shell Creek, and Elk Park on the 1,300 sq ft narrow gauge layout. Lots of pictures and videos were made because these were the last runs by Society members on this layout in its present location, a spot where these little locomotives have been hauling their consists for more than 11 years. More on that later in this column.

Two days after the Historical Society departed Johnson

City, the members of the Carter RR Museum were busy gathering tables from around the Tri-Cities area for the 7th Annual Big Train Show sponsored by the railroad museum. It took more than 375 tables to meet the needs of more than 70 vendors and 6 model train layouts for this year's show which was the largest in every way that we have had to date. Our model train display layouts varied from Z-Scale to a 10,000 sq ft HO-Scale layout operated by Sippin-N-Switchin, plus one operated by live steam. Attendance at the show was great and the vendors were satisfied with their sales. We are already making plans for next year's event.

We closed the George L. Carter Railroad Museum on Saturday, June 3, the day the Big Train Show ended after 15 years of serving the public on the ETSU campus. Our members, the Mountain Empire Model Railroaders and the George L. Carter Chapter NRHS, have been working almost daily since June 8th packing up all the items that are not nailed or cemented down that have accumulated over a decade and a half at the museum. The very old university building we occupy is slated for demolition later this fall to make way for a new modern classroom building and all occupants have to vacate the premises by September 1, 2023. We are working with the university administration and the city of Johnson City, along with a possible landlord of a suitable offcampus building, to find us a new larger home.

As the deadline clock continues to tick down we are packing boxes by the score and storing them temporarily in some of the vacated rooms down the hall in this building. The layouts will be the last items to be readied for moving. All the items, vehicles, buildings, etc. that are not fastened to them are being removed and packed. When all of this is accomplished we will begin the task of disassembling the layouts into sections that can be taken out of the building either through the corridors and doorways, or though openings cut into the exterior walls. Hopefully, by the time this happens we will have a lease agreement for a new home for the museum and we can move the layouts directly into it. Many of the other items may have to be stored until the layouts are in place before we can begin that phase of unpacking.

A new home for the museum off campus in a non-university owned building means we will be entering a new era of operation for the Carter Railroad Museum. For the first time we will be renting space from a landlord. This means instead of being open to the public for 5 hours one day a week (as has been our schedule from our inception on the ETSU campus), we will be open 5 days/week and will have to monetize the museum with admission charges. We will have overhead, including salaried positions (new for us as well), and will be conducting several fund-raisers annually in addition to applying for grants to support the museum. We will continue to host the Annual Big Train Show and run several public rail excursions each year. So, things will soon be changing drastically for us as we become an incorporated 501(c) (3) non-profit museum. Wish us luck!

We have a story to tell that links the origins of Johnson City and that of ETSU with the railroad history of the region and we intend to tell it well. We appreciate the ET&WNC RR Historical Society's long affiliation with the George L. Carter Railroad Museum and we look forward to serving you and the public for many years to come.

As we solidify our future with a new site for the museum we will keep you all informed and look forward to your future visits in 2024. I am most optimistic that all of this will get worked out and the "new" Carter Railroad Museum will be bigger and better than ever. Come see us!

Doe River Gorge

Mark Milbourne reports from Hampton, TN -

Camp season is in full swing and the railroad is again busy... weekdays carrying campers to activities and Saturdays taking guests on scenic trips during our Day Quest program. This year again, one Saturday is a company picnic for Nuclear Fuel Services with a very large crowd, about 700, expected. Also, as usual, parents are offered a ride on Sunday afternoons after they check-in their campers.

Track maintenance continues apace, thanks to the full-time (for the summer) crew of volunteer Rick Paffrath and "RR interns" Ethan Freeman and Evan Black. So far they've replaced about 80 crossties, in between handling the daily motorcar operations for campers. Ethan was also here last summer and regularly in the fall and spring as well and has filmed much of the work for his YouTube channel "190 Tweetsie", which has grown to over 100,000 subscribers! So you may want to check out his channel. Also our "original RR volunteer" Phil Raynes was recently here to spend a few days with the crew and we noted that it was 25 years ago that he and I began the original track restoration efforts, installing a few ties just beyond the first tunnel.

We were of course happy to see many of you at the convention on May 28, in spite of the rain. We were grateful for the roofed coaches and a hardy 10 or so even braved the unsheltered motorcar ride to the bridge. During lunch that day I shared that grading work for the new Christmas Train loop was imminent and indeed it has now begun. Several large pieces of equipment are now on site and preliminary work has begun on silt fences and drainage pipe. We are still grappling with details and cost issues on the locomotive shop plan, but that process is also moving forward.

We've known since the early planning of the Christmas Train project that it would require additional staff. So we've been very pleased to have David Poteat join us in early April. David brings many years of general mechanical experience as well as RR and steam-specific experience from his time on the New Georgia RR which included steam operations and restoration of A&WP 290. The timing of his arrival has been great as well, making him available to help work though the various current logistics and details on construction. He has also already been to Minnesota to inspect progress on the new boiler for the first Porter, which should be ready by early fall. And he is also starting to go through the chassis and running gear, so it will be ready for the new boiler when it arrives. David also dove in, almost on day one, to oversee the repair of our diesel loco, which was suddenly out of service with coolant in the oil, and right on the cusp of springtime operations for guest groups and school field trips. The engine had to be pulled and sent out to the local Caterpillar shop. Thankfully there was no crank/bearing damage. The culprit was a leaking water pump seal, and it also received new head and cylinder sleeve gaskets. And it was back in time to handle the peak weeks of traffic (and the ET&WNC convention). In the meantime we made due with motorcar rides for the preliminary groups. The little "deezul" has given us 19 years of quite reliable service and with the engine work, should now have many more to give.

If you didn't make it to the convention, there are still opportunities to see the Gorge on many Saturdays through the end of August, as our Day Quest program continues. And by the time you read this, the rhododendron along the track should be in full bloom. Hope everyone has a great summer and maybe we'll even see track being laid by this fall! Tweetsie Railroad Happenings

Tweetsie Railroad's 2023 season is rolling along, with three all-new rides debuting this past April: In Country

Fair, replacing our previous free fall ride, is the Buckaroo Drop – taller than the previous ride...and it rotates too! The "Barrels of Fun" spinning figure-eight coaster has proven to be popular with the whole family. And on Miners Mountain the Mini-Swing is great for young children.

On the railroad side, the first of five excursion cars returned to service this spring after a complete overhaul. The other four will follow over the next several months, joined by an all-new excursion car being constructed from scratch. Several hundred more crossties will be replaced in the 2023-24 "slow" season, and the final details of the Trestle refurbishment project will also be completed. Both steam locomotives have been in service this spring and summer and are running well, with the #12 taking lead duty during the recent Thomas The Tank Engine event.

Railroad Heritage Weekend is August 26th

and 27th. A schedule will be announced in the coming weeks on our web site. Our condolences to the family of Matt Bumgarner, who was always an eager contributor to this event and will be sorely missed this year.
